HERITAGE LEGACY MEMBER May/June 2023 Highlight



WAYNE KRAEMER

Wayne Kraemer proudly wears his born-and-bred southern gentleman charm on his sleeve. You can't miss the nuanced signs—the crisply starched plaid shirt that has become his sartorial signature and his affable Thibodaux, Louisiana easy, confident manner.

Raised in Catholic disciplines at Mt. Carmel for grades 1-3 and Thibodaux College after 4th grade, Wayne graduated from E.D. White Catholic High School instilled with a respect for heritage and tradition. The first time he thought about preservation was when the iconic Mt. Carmel school, built in 1856, was demolished to build a Holiday Inn. A friend's mother bought a chandelier before it was destroyed only later to discover that the nuns had painted over the gold frame so that civil war officers would not confiscate it.

Wayne attended Nichols State with plans of being a lawyer, and a brief consideration as a ranger at Natchez Trace Parkway. Eventually he switched majors to speech communication when the debater took root. He graduated with his master's degree from LSU in 1977 and taught for a year at LSU before being offered the debate coaching job at Texas A&M where he took the team to their first appearance in the National Debate Tournament. When asked qualities a student needs to be a good debater, he actually described himself: likes research, is a critical thinker and excels as a speaker. Wayne, the quintessential debater, is focused and steady, a good listener, always prepared, and maintains a professional demeanor. Being a part of the Aggie culture included "yell practice", a ritual before the first home game where you show up at midnight for a pep rally to yell, not cheer, yell. Amazing what they teach you in college.

He left TX A&M in 1986 to teach at William and Mary in Williamsburg, VA. Built in 1693, it is the second oldest institution of higher education in the U.S. After four years, Wayne admits it was a beautiful Colonial town but never felt like home. The holidays, however, were magical. The Grand Illumination on Duke of Gloucester Street was lit up with windows dressed in candles from one end to the other and decorated with festive fruits, pine and magnolia leaves in true southern charm.

In 1990, a good friend leaving TXST, encouraged Wayne to apply for his position. In the fall he moved to San Marcos where he has lived in his historic home since 1993. While at TXST his debate teams won two national team championships and several individual national championships.

Wayne joined Heritage during the Trilogy Home Tour, became an active board member, and was appointed as president in 2008. He was also instrumental in the formation of the Heritage Debutant Ball. In addition, Wayne is one of the founders of the Krewe of Okeanos, now in its 12th year. He was appointed King in 2022. The Krewe celebrates Mardi Gras in San Marcos with a ball, parade, and other parties as well as donates to music and the arts programs.

The LBJ Museum was a natural fit It seemed appropriate for the Director of the LBJ debate team at TXST to participate in a public debate at the museum. That evolved into being on the board and eventually to become the museum president.

His research collaboration with Dr. Ann Burnette has produced several papers. One was for Hofstra University and another for Leiden outside of Amsterdam. In a nutshell, one addressed President Obama's characterization of the DACA situation and the other, President Biden's National Security Strategies.

Wayne's retirement plans are on the horizon to teach for two more years and then travel to Louisiana where his son and 7 year old granddaughter reside. With a passion for history, he will probably continue to do research and write. For a southern gentleman, retiring on quiet, historic Belvin Street is undoubtedly a perfect scenario to entertain friends after of career of contribution. Visitors will probably be offered a glass of something cold, as any gracious host does, and Wayne might even bring out a book about Thibodaux where his story began.
